#### **IMPRESSA Award Criteria**

- Contribution to agricultural knowledge through research as evidenced by high quality publications in peer reviewed journals
- Development oriented scientific research with demonstrated impact
- University postgraduate teaching and student supervision, student and staff mentorshin
- Demonstrated engagement with peer researchers, farmers, extension and policy
- Contribution towards institutional capacity building
- Sustained and demonstrated dissemination of research findings and outputs to diversity of consumers

#### **RUFORUM UNIVERSITIES IMPROVE WEBOMETRICS RANKINGS**

Webometrics, an organisation that monitors university performance worldwide has released its official global ranking of universities for July 2010. In Africa, Universities in South Africa maintain their top position in the Continent and similarly at global level. Webometrics releases the ranking twice a year which is based on university online research publications. Among the RUFORUM 25 Universities, Makerere University was ranked highest (13th position) (See Table on Page 2), followed by the University of Nairobi (26th position) and University of Zimbabwe (30th position). The decision on Award winners is the responsibility of an Independent International Expert Evaluation Panel.

In 2009/10 the Expert Panel received a total of 10 nominations as follows: Ethiopia – 2, Kenya – 4, Sudan - 1, Uganda – 2, Zimbabwe – 1. The Independent Evaluation Panel was led by Dr. Monty Jones, Executive Director of FARA, Professor Didier Pillot, President Agrinatura, Dr. Win Andriesse, Wageningen University and Professor Dixelius Christina of Swedish Agriculture University.

#### Winners of the 2009/10 (Inaugural) IMPRESSA Awards

The 2009/10 IMPRESSA Awards ceremony was held in Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso during the FARA 5<sup>th</sup> Africa Science Week and General Assembly. The prizes were presented by Dr. Papa Abdoulaye Seck, the Director General of Africa Rice Center in Senegal.

#### FIRST PLACE: PROF. SHEUNESU MPEPEREKI

Prof. Mpepereki is a Zimbabwean, born in 1951. He is a Professor of Soil Science at University of Zimbabwe, and currently Professorial Chair at the same university. Prof. Mpepereki was recognized for his outstanding Soya bean research and



outreach, which has made significant contribution to food and income security in Zimbabwe. He ably linked university research process to private sector, policy and other actors and used the research to train several scientist for Zimbabwe. He has published over 70 articles in refereed journals, books, extension manuals, newsletters, brochures and information sheets. He has also supervised over 40 graduate students. He received a trophy and US\$ 10,000.

#### SECOND PLACE: PROF. BELAY KASSA

Professor Belay Kassa was born on August 3, 1961 in Ethiopia. He is a Professor of Applied Economics and President of Haramaya University. Prof Kassa has previously served Haramaya University as Academic Registrar and Research Vice President in addition to teaching, research and outreach responsibilities. He was recognized for his outstanding leadership and networking. Through his efforts, Haramaya University is a beneficiary of



AGRA's Programme for African Seed Systems and Soil Health Programme. These two programmes provide funds to equip laboratories and train students in soil science and seed science and technology at Haramaya

University. Prof. Kassa received a trophy and US\$ 7,000.

#### THIRD PLACE: PROF. MARY O. O. ABUKUTSA

Prof. Mary O.O. Abukutsa is a Kenyan National born in 1959. She is a Professor of horticulture at Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology in Kenya. She is an authority on African indigenous vegetables. She has worked as a



researcher in NERICA-rice research initiative promoted by Japanese International Cooperation Agency (JICA) and AICAD. She has supervised 55 undergraduate and 20 postgraduate students and published 30 peer reviewed journal papers, 40 papers in refereed conference proceedings and 5 book chapters. In 2009 she was the Winner of the Women in Science Competitions. Prof. Abukutsa received a trophy and US\$ 5,000. 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# SADC-ICART WORKSHOP ON STRENGTHENING PROPOSAL AND SCIENTIFIC COMMUNICATION FOR POSTGRADUATE STUDENTS

The SADC Secretariat through the Implementation and Coordination of Agricultural Research and Training (ICART) project sponsored a regional workshop on proposal development and scientific communication for young scientists in southern Africa. The workshop which was coordinated by RUFORUM was held in Lusaka, Zambia between 17th and 25th May 2010 for 48 Masters students drawn from Free State University in the Republic of South Africa, University of Zambia in Zambia, University of Zimbabwe in Zimbabwe and Sokoine University of Agriculture in Tanzania. The participants were from a very broad background and areas of discipline as well as nationalities. The ICART project is a fiveyear regional project funded under the 9th European Development Funds (9th EDF). It is implemented by the SADC Secretariat, within the Agricultural Research and Development Unit of the FANR Directorate. ICART Project support ranges from strengthening capacity for appropriate technology generation to empowerment of researchers and development practitioners to organize into knowledge sharing networks.

The workshop was facilitated by Dr Washington Ochola of RUFORUM together with Prof. Robert Obura and Dr Isaiah Tabu both of Egerton University in Kenya. The three have wide experience in proposal and scientific writing facilitation. The workshop principally aimed at tackling the defi-

ciencies in proposal and scientific writing skills in universities that make it difficult for scientists to win competitive grants and conduct quality research. These deficiencies also limit contribution of the regional scientists to advancement in science and knowledge, while poor communication skills impair the visibility of university Research for Development (R4D). It targeted the postgraduate students, the future scientists and academic staff in universities and national research institutions who play important roles in research for development.

By enhancing broad communication and scientific writing skills in young scientists and seasoned researchers in the region SADC and RUFORUM hope to jointly help realize the dream of greater contribution of Southern African scientists to development and global knowledge. Rather than provide skill enhancement training at the individual university level, it was considered more efficient to tackle these deficiencies by group learning event organized for the benefit of postgraduate students from different universities in Southern Africa. The workshop involved presentations, discussion and experience sharing as well as computer based practical work. The training was participatory, interactive and practical involving output-based development of proposals and concepts targeting active calls for proposals including International Foundation for Science (IFS) young scientists' grants and other calls. The participants also developed extended abstracts and posters for the upcoming RUFORUM biennial conference set for 13-17 September 2010 in Entebbe, Uganda.

- 6 grants (US\$ 2,500) to MSc. Students at Sokoine University of Agriculture;

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### AFRICA MUST STRENGTHEN CAPACITY TO IMPLEMENT CAADP

Highlights of FARA General Assembly Capacity Strengthening Side Event

Africa is implementing several initiatives to revamp agriculture and ensure that it addresses the endemic food and nutrition insecurity as well as poverty. As part of the activities to promote, share knowledge and experiences, as well as support convergence and consensus building on Africa's development thrusts, the 5<sup>th</sup> Agricultural Science Week and The Forum for Agricultural Research in Africa (FARA) General Assembly with an overall theme of "African Agricultural Innovation in a Changing Global Environment was held in Ougadougou, Burkina Faso from 19th t0 20th July 2010. It was attended by over 700 delegates across the world. A Capacity Strengthening side-event on "New directions for agricultural knowledge centres and networks in strengthening capacities for African agricultural innovation" was part of the activities. The Capacity Strengthening sideevent was organized by FARA in conjunction with The Regional Universities Forum for Capacity Building in Agriculture (RUFORUM), The University of the Free State, South Africa, Agri-NATURA and Sup-Agro, France, Internationale Weiterbildung und Entwickling gGMbH (InWent). It was underpinned by the following:

- The 2009 RUFORUM/CTA African Agriculture Faculty Deans' meeting that identified key action points for increased engagement of African Universities in agricultural development and research.
- The 2010 GCARD meeting which discussed and approved the Capacities' Montpellier Action Plan (CAPMAP 2010-2020) calling for the revamping of capacity building systems for IAR4D.
- New thrusts in agricultural development focusing on value chains requiring significant changes in curricula and approaches to capacity building.
- The current focus on using innovation systems to delivery development solutions requiring mobilization of consortia to harness the available capacities in and outside of Africa.
- The return of agriculture to development agenda that requires increased investment, new and wider partnerships between Northern and Southern Universities.
- The need to build capacity to catalyze and consolidate implementation of Pillar IV of the Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP).

These and other issues guided the design and discussion of the side event with the purpose of "ensuring concerted action and targeted advocacy for research, capacity building, enabling policies and institutional change." The event consisted of five sessions, involving high-level panel discussions, keynote presentations, thematic discussions and an exhibition. The five sessions included, (i) Experiences in capacity strengthening for agricultural research and development in Africa, (ii) Engendering agricultural research and development for enhanced participation of women, (iii) Education and training in Sub-Saharan Africa, (iv) Realizing the potential of Africa's youth: linking university education, research and business in sustainable agriculture (Launch of UniBRAIN), (v) Moving forward the Capacities Montpellier Action Plan (CAPMAP), and (vi) Consolidation of sessions (i-v) outcomes. The meeting in general, advanced a framework for concerted action by a range of African institutions, international agencies, researchers, communities and government agencies at different levels in capacity strengthening for the agricultural sector.

#### **Outcomes and Recommendations**

**1. Intensifying agricultural education in SSA**. Two major recommendations were made:

Realisation of CAPMAP. The meeting recognized two major approaches to capacity strengthening (i) The initial training of human resources on skills and expertise for supporting innovation, i.e., "Building Capacities for Capacity Building" and (ii) The continuous upgrading of capacities of all the professionals and stakeholders who have a role in the innovation chain. The meeting noted that the CAPMAP is based on the premise that success of capacity building initiatives however excellent can only have impact on policy issues when they are part of a larger convergence and political alliances at a higher scale. The meeting **recommended that**: FARA and its partners in the region, as well as development partners, converge, implement and promote recommendations in the CAP-MAP to improve impact level, harness diversity, build institutions, consolidate and up and out-scale lessons, and strengthen advocacy for investments in capacity strengthening for ARD in Africa.

Intensification of capacity strengthening by Universities and their networks. Whereas the CAADP process contains several opportunities for strengthening capacities for agricultural development, it is not clear how the contemporary approaches to research and innovation capacity strengthening can be done to mobilize the needed capacity. The meeting noted the disconnect in some cases, and the weak linkages in most cases, between research, agricultural education, outreach and other development activities including agribusiness. Moreover, the complex agricultural development landscape requires

integration of capacity strengthening initiatives for coherence, synergy, value-addition, cost-effectiveness and impact. Accordingly, improving the "reach" of capacity strengthening programmes will require clarification of (i) The structure, scope and scale of interventions, (ii) Who the targets are, and (iii) The time frame for implementation. In line with these, the CAPMAP and aspirations of CAADP the meeting recommended:

- Consolidation of achievements from the innovative regional capacity building initiatives such as SCARDA and others in the region.
- Intensification of advocacy for investment in Higher Education (HE) at the Ministerial Conference on HE in Agriculture in November 2010 under the leadership of RUFORUM, FARA and other partners.
- Enhancing capacity and support African institutions to source and contribute to the use of global resources for capacity development, ARD and development activities.
- Strengthening capacity in Africa for foresight planning by engaging regional and global institutions to support medium to long term strategic planning for the continent.

# 2. Linking University education, research and business in sustainable agriculture

The meeting noted that agribusiness success is needed to boost growth of the agricultural sector. It was also noted that the strategy of catalyzing partnerships between Universities and private sector following the concept of innovation incubators needs support. The meeting adopted the definition of an incubation center, i.e., "an organization managed by specialized professionals, whose main aim is to increase the wealth of its community by promoting the culture of innovation and the competitiveness of its associated businesses and knowledge-based institutions in the agro-allied sector'. The meeting also took cognizance of

two critical factors that influence success of agribusinesses in Africa, i.e., **The operational environment** that affects performance and **internal success** factors that affects human resource productivity and quality, market penetration and leadership. On the basis of these and other discussions it was recommended that:

- The UniBRAIN approach to promoting agricultural innovation and improving tertiary agribusiness education in Africa by linking universities with business and research through university-led agribusiness incubators be promoted and lessons captured for up-scaling purposes.
- FARA and its partners advance proposals for providing all interested parties with easy access to constantly up -to-date information on ongoing and pipeline initiatives for strengthening Africa's capacity to build capacity in agriculture and natural resources and identify the critical gaps and a business plan to guide investment on a continent-wide scale.

#### 3. Engendering agricultural research and development

The meeting noted (1) The misconceptions about gender roles from community to organization level that undermine the design, implementation and sustainability of development initiatives especially those that involve women such as in agriculture and (2) MDG 3 on promoting gender equality and empowering women remains a challenge for Africa. It recommended:

- Creating an enabling policy and structural environment for gender mainstreaming through policy audit and reform, restructuring and budgeting.
- Increasing enrolment, retention and performance of women in higher education, organizations and agricultural development activities by consolidating, up and out-scale best practices such as mentoring, social support programmes, remedial training, affirmative action etc.
- Engaging and intensifying partnerships between local and international institutions, to advocate, promote and strengthen capacity among ARD, Agricultural Education and Training, farmer and rural development agencies addressing gender concerns in agriculture and rural development.
- Developing monitoring and evaluation systems for performance management of gender targeted interventions in agriculture and other development initiatives including mutual accountability.

#### THE ASSOCIATION OF AFRICAN UNIVERSITIES (AAU) AWARDS TWO GRANTS TO RUFORUM

The Association of African Universities and RUFORUM have further strengthened their collaboration towards engaging African universities to respond to the Millennium Development Goals. In addition to previous research grants to RUFORUM Member Universities (See page 4) AAU has awarded two grants to RUFORUM, totalling £200,000 under AAU's programme on "Mobilisation for Regional Capacity Initiative" (MRCI) that is funded by the Department for International Development (DFID) of the United Kingdom. The two AAU supported RUFORUM Projects, each for a duration of 18 months (May 2010 to November 2011) are highlighted below:

Enhancing the Contribution of Universities to Development Processes in Eastern and Southern Africa. This MCRI Project brings together RUFORUM, Makerere University and the University of Malawi's Bunda College to explore approaches to re-orient university activities for development relevance; ensuring responsiveness to evolving stake-

holder demands; strengthening capacity for engagement at different levels, including with policy and strengthening networking to ensure cross learning and economies of scale and scope. The Project inception meeting will be held during the Annual General Meeting of RUFORUM in Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe.

Transforming Teaching and Learning in RUFORUM Universities through the Development of E-Content. Egerton University and Bunda College of Agriculture are the implementing partner universities, focusing on the MSc Agricultural Information Communication Management (Egerton University) and the PhD in Aquaculture and Fisheries Science( Bunda College of Agriculture). The key outcome of this project will be e-learning content for the ten selected courses in the two academic programmes. #### PAEPARD OFFICIALLY LAUNCHED AT THE FARA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Platform for African - European Partnership in Agricultural Research for Development (PAEPARD) Phase II Project was officially launched in a colourful ceremony at the recently concluded FARA General Assembly in Ouagadougou, Burkina Faso on 20 July, 2010. Supported by the European Commission (Contributiono of Euro 5.5M), and building on the PA-EPARD Phase I, PAEPARD II aims to build joint African-European multi-stakeholder partnerships in agricultural research for development contributing to achieving the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). The specific outcome is enhanced, more equitable, more demand-driven and mutually beneficial collaboration of Africa and Europe on agricultural research for development with the aim of attaining the MDGs. The main beneficiaries of the project are European and African ARD stakeholders including the constituents of FARA and EFARD, who will be better organized, coordinated and able to successfully participate in European and other research programmes. The PAEPARD African consortium is coordinated

the Forum for Agricultural Research in Africa (FARA) and the European consortium is coordinated by Agrinatura – EEIG on behalf of European Forum for Agricultural Research for Development (EFARD). The launch was officiated by Dr. Monty Jones, Executive Director, FARA and Dr. Paola Sarfarti, Director, Agrinatura EEIG.

The project is designed into seven work packages (WP): (1) mobilizing European stakeholders; (2) mobilizing non-research African stakeholders; (3) information and communication; (4) capacity building; (5) innovation partnerships; (6) advocacy and (7) project management and coordination. Each work package has a leader and co-leader combining African and European organizations (see below) RUFORUM, together with ICRA are leading Work Package 4 on Capacity Building.
